It was further explained to me that the local store depended on those campground residents to get them through the slower parts of the winter.



Locals Uneasy About YMCA of Greater Seattle's Proposed Campsite on Mineral Lake

After the YMCA of Greater Seattle handed in a pre-submission application to Lewis County Community

Development seeking to develop a year-round campsite on Mineral Lake, Lewis County Fire District 9 in Mineral
and some locals are feeling apprehensive about the proposed project.

The application, received by Lewis County Community Development on March 13, seeks to develop anywhere from 500 acres to 2,118 acres of land that stretches north of Mineral Lake over a 20-year period for a campsite that would ultimately support 400 campers and 100 staff members.

The 20-year development plan includes three phases, the first would kick off in 2021 and would support only 12 campers, then from 2022 to 2027 the camp will increase its capacity to 200 campers and 50 staff members before it ultimately reaches a capacity of 400 campers and 100 staffers from 2027 to 2040, according to the presubmission application.

The YMCA is looking to purchase the 2,118 acres, owned by Forecastle Timber, that covers the northern half of Mineral Lake's waterfront, extends to the Nisqually river that runs adjacent to the property's northern border, and is bordered by Mineral Hill Road to the west and Mineral Creek to the east, according to a map included in the YMCA's pre-submission application.

A pre-submission conference between representatives of the YMCA of Greater Seattle and Lewis County Community Development was scheduled for April 2 but was canceled due to the coronavirus pandemic.

In lieu of the meeting, Lewis County Community Development gathered comments from county personnel and other local agencies and answered questions submitted by the YMCA in a document that The Chronicle has obtained.

Bruce Richie, a fire commissioner for Fire District 9 in Mineral, wrote on behalf of the fire district that the department would not be able to provide adequate emergency services to all 2,118 acres of the proposed project.

Richie noted that the planned dock and water activities would require the department to acquire fire and rescue watercraft and additional training which it could not afford with it's approximate annual budget of \$54,000.

"Even if we had the additional funds, equipment and personnel, we would still be lacking fire hydrants, water supply and wide enough paved roads for our large fire engines, tenders and ambulances to reach all occupied areas and campsites in the proposed development," Richie wrote.

The issue of an adequate water supply was also brought up by Lewis County. Sue Kennedy, a senior environmental health specialist for Lewis County Public Health and Social Services, wrote, "A well that produces water of sufficient quantity and quality may be problematic in this area."

Kennedy provided previous well logs from the area that indicate attaining a water source capable of producing the water necessary to operate the camp could be troublesome.

She also noted that wells drilled deeply in the proposed area may encounter realgar, a volcanic formation that contains arsenic, a regulated contaminant due to its health impacts.

Additionally, Scott Pollock of the Washington State Department of Health's Office of Drinking Water concluded that "Water quantity and/or quality could be potential deal breakers for the proposed development."

Pollock wrote that the water source should be capable of supplying about 50 gallons of water per person per day for the duration of any intended events. In the YMCA's pre-submission application, the organization estimated it would need about 30,000 gallons of water per day based upon existing water use from other regional camps.

The Mineral Lake Lions Club, a group of local leaders in Mineral, echoed many of the concerns Fire District 9 raised and also questioned how the YMCA intended on obtaining 30,000 gallons of water per day.

But the Lions Club was disappointed that the YMCA of Greater Seattle did not reach out to Mineral residents directly about their intentions before the nonprofit submitted their pre-submission application in March.

In a statement, the Lions Club wrote that while the organization does not represent the Mineral community as a whole, it believes its concerns reflect those of the community and surrounding areas.

"While we understand that the YMCA of Greater Seattle has no legal obligation to our organization or the residents of Mineral, we were disappointed that the community had not been contacted prior to their initial pre-submission application to Lewis County," The Lions Club wrote in the statement.

I am writing today as a Mineral, WA resident to express my deepest concern for the proposed rezone of the land purchased by the YMCA. The proposed project nearly triples our small town capacity during several weeks. This presents an infrastructure problem. They did a lack luster water study during the rainy season sighting all our wells at incorrect depths. My first concern is this and the possibility that they literally run the water table so low we are forced to drill deeper which is astronomically expensive. We personally would have to sell and take a loss. My second concern is emergency services as Sheriff Snaza has stated resources out here are limited and few and far between. If you add that many people and children who are by nature more prone to accidents we now not only don't have the capacity or staff to accommodate injuries and illness but the wait times for an elderly person having a stroke or other medical emergency would be devastatingly increased. They had said they were speaking to local agencies however as Snaza has said it's not feasible. I feel like they are telling the commission what it wants to hear without a real plan in place. I urge you to speak to the local fire department because the volunteers there have very strongly expressed the same concerns. The way of life here is what I would call magical, I'm one of the younger residents (late 30s) this isn't a place of noise and traffic. It is a place of beauty and calm and that's why we bought here. The sound from the lake carries over the town. You can occasionally hear a single fisherman in triumph! The noise pollution alone would severely disrupt our way of life. And finally the roads, our roads are not equipped to handle double to triple the traffic. I had asked the ymca representative what the plan was for the destruction of our roads and she said they were a non profit and roads were funded by the people not them and it wouldn't add "that much traffic". I work construction, I know how heavy those vehicles are and our roads aren't built to withstand a major project like they are proposing. How are these construction supplies getting there? Before the resort ever comes to life the construction alone will have devastating effects on the roads, the quiet and the wildlife and that's all before the resort has devastating effects on our water and emergency services. I would like to remind the commission that the opposition to this project comes from your voters, the people who put our trust in you. The following statement, in part, and accompanying petitions were part of the oral testimony given during the BOCC Hearing of February 14, 2023. This written testimony is being provided as a more comprehensive testimony and to ensure the voices of the petitioners are heard.

Since the YMCA Rezone was proposed and Lewis County residents have become more aware of the proposal, those of us in the rural towns, especially, have watched with dismay. We have watched a sister community try to fight against a large corporation, struggling but persistent. All the time, we have been thinking "We're so thankful it's not being proposed in our community". At the same time, many of us feel we need to speak up and stand united as residents of rural Lewis County. Since the Workshop last week, over 160 signatures of Lewis County residents in opposition to the YMCA rezone have been gathered. I represent those individuals today.

First, I would like to speak to economics. The YMCA has stated they would waive their non-profit status and pay property taxes. As an officer for 2 small non-profits, I question whether that is legal or a binding promise in the eyes of the IRS; it would seem either you are or you are not a non-profit. That aside, what about the other taxes and fees that would normally be assessed a corporation doing business in Lewis County: sales tax; lodging tax; etc.? Research of the other 2 YMCA camps in WA indicates they charge approx. \$495/child for a 2-day campout; \$396 is the subsidized rate. Rough calculations based on 400 attendees is over \$158,000 per 2-day stay. Will Lewis County benefit from that?

According to the OFM, between 2019 and 2020, the median household income in Lewis County dropped by \$4,000/year thus ranking the county 33rd out of 45; the 2021 projection was lower, ranking the county 37th of 45. That is 9th from the bottom. The vast majority of Lewis County families could never afford to attend the YMCA campground. How will Lewis County families benefit from that?

The current YMCA resort proposal (let's quit calling it a campground because it is not-it is a resort) at a minimum includes numerous cabins, a dining hall providing 3 meals/day,

Hello. I would like to again express my endorsement for rezoning the 500 acres along Mineral Lake from FRL to MPR. I listened intently to the hearing on February 14th for the Board of County Commissioners, and remain convinced that this rezone would be the best option for this land.

I understand the YMCA purchased this 500 acres, comprised of 32 individual parcels, now designated as FRL, after careful review of many alternate sites in the state. The Lewis County Planning Commission unanimously approved this rezoning. The Planning staff of Lewis County have determined that this change

conforms to the requirements of the Growth Management Act, is consistent with the county-wide planning policies and the comprehensive plan, and would create jobs needed.

Here are my main reasons for support of this rezone request:

- 1. Property rights are an inherent right of all individuals in this country, including Lewis County. This land was legally purchased, and it is not up to the residents of Mineral or Lewis County to decide if they like or don't like the purchaser. The YMCA, should they be denied this rezone, will likely sell this property to be developed by a developer, constructing 32 individual expensive lakefront homes, with individual docks, etc. I guarantee this option will be less palatable than a kids camp, which would leave 40% of the 500 acres wild. If you own property, you have the right to sell it to whoever you wish.
- 2. Mineral is a dying community and needs jobs. 100 camp employees, even if only seasonal, would add a big boost to the community. Since moving here 5 years ago, my observation has been that long-time residents do not want anything to change. Every idea for economic development is shot down, and this county remains one of the poorest in the state. It is my observation that poverty is celebrated, and development is discouraged. Mineral just lost its one and only store a month ago, and its population has declined nearly 50% in the last decade. If Mineral is to survive as a community, development is crucial. For every person who says "I don't want anything to change" in this county, I challenge them to immediately think of 2 things they can do in the next month to encourage prosperity, self sufficiency and opportunity for the children of this rural area. Lewis County's largest export is its children, because it has no jobs to offer our youth.
- 3. I honestly cannot think of a better neighbor than a youth camp. If 40% of the 500 acres remains wild, there would be minimal impact to wildlife and the look and feel of Mineral Lake. The youth of this county, and the state, deserve to have a camp such as this, so close to Mount Rainier, Mount Saint Helens, the Goat Rocks, etc. Don't we all have great memories from attending camp as a kid that we would like to provide for the youth of this state and county? I live in Randle, and I can assure you that with the Cispus Learning Center, which hosts every 5th grader in the state, there is not a large objection to this wonderful space for kids. In fact, quite the opposite. I have attended fund-raisers for Cispus, and the overwhelming feeling of others there is "I remember coming here as a kid and it was one of the best experiences of my life". Let's give that to more kids in the state.
- 4. I was alarmed to hear other testifiers at the hearing on the 14th state that many residents

- are for this rezone, but fear their neighbors retribution if their identities become known. This is not acceptable. People must feel safe to have open discussions on the future of their community. No "behind closed doors" discussions should be determining this rezone.
- 5. At the hearing, concerns were raised about whether support services such as EMS and law enforcement could meet the needs of such a camp. This is a legitimate question, but with the additional property taxes, the necessary services could be provided. With any community growth, additional services are added, and you cannot rely on staffing only for past populations and amenities to provide future services.
- 6. As far as I can tell, there are no reasons not to approve this rezone. Lewis County Planning staff have done an amazing job of researching the issues, and no issue stands out as a reason not to do this. The Growth Management Act requirements are met, no SEPA issues have been identified, and the YMCA is paying property taxes (even when they could opt out) to enhance the community.

Lewis county needs to move forward, and accept economic development, growth and find opportunity for our children, and not continue to accept the dismal poverty and loss of jobs and services of the past 30 years as what they want for their children's future. The future is now, and in my eyes, it is bright and wonderful.

Hello,

We are writing to express our wholehearted and thoroughly researched support of the Mineral Rezone.

Margot Page has written already (see attached), citing the need for positive change in a town that has only gone downhill (economically, demographically, and in terms of crime) in the past years and months. This need is part of the requirements for any rezone. The undersigned wholeheartedly support her previous mail, and this one.

Today, we are writing to

- ensure the Commissioners are aware that the fullness of Mineral voices are not being heard, in large part due to the intimidation tactics of the "No Mineral Rezone" effort.
- Note again that, though many stand up against change, change has already come; our town is dying and needs help. On the slide about Land Use, it's pointed out that you need to demonstrate town need. Please see the attached mail for that.

Ms. Page spoke about this at the Feb 14 hearing. Examples include:

- No Mineral Rezone yard signs. These have gotten a lot of airplay in press about the topic. But if you ask people who have those signs, many will say, "Oh, Dave put that up and it's not worth arguing with him. I think the camp is a good idea. The commission will know that." People discussed putting up their own "Support the Rezone!" signs, but were concerned about property damage and of course, in a small town, nobody wants to start a war, or fan the flames
- **Facebook intimidation.** In January, when 40-year Mineral resident Gary Johnson wrote to the Chronicle about his firm support, his article was posted to the Facebook group for Mineral with the comments, "Who even is this guy?" and "He is clueless" and "We need to prove him wrong." Mineral pretty much runs on Facebook and the anti-crowd is there with bells on, ensuring that anyone who dares speak in support is made to feel disloyal to the town.
- Pro-Rezone people fearing putting their names on letters, or showing up to the community meetings. When I wrote my letter of February 13, I sent it around to several people who support the rezone. Seven people were willing to be quoted (names below);
 12 said, "You know I support it, but _____ knows where I live. Those people are too

angry."

Change is here, and it's unhealthy, and we need to switch the direction of change from downhill to hopeful. The anti-voices are loud and strong, and want to change to a way of life that has already vanished. People stood up to say, "My family has been in this town for four generations..." but four generations ago, do you know what Mineral looked like? It had a thriving, 200-student elementary school. Three stores. A robust logging population.

Today, the school is closed, as is the last store. Crime, drugs, and squalor are rampant. Change has already come. If Mineral is to survive, it needs that change to be positive. It needs the rezone, and the life, money, and possibility that come from renewed attention.

Please support the rezone. Mineral needs it.

If we say no to this rezoning proposal, we say no to our children, to future families, to a connection to our land. We are responsible to steward this incredible county, to show the rest of Washington State the pride we have in our small, rural towns, and to be an example of successful development that is for our community.

We as Mineral residence are adamantly opposed to the rezone, and we are respectfully asking the BOCC to vote NO on the YMCA Rezone!

First, we would like to say that we feel that the rezoning and project/permitting process seem out of order and we would like you the council to look into resequencing the process! You as the council should have the full knowledge and understanding of a project prior to approval/rejection of a project. An example would be that the YMCA talks about low impact to the environment and infrastructure, which would be true at their "initial" use/phase, but when they are putting thousands of kids, and a high number of single use vehicles over the roadways at "full build up" that will have a significant impact. But since you are limited by what you can consider at this point of the approval process, you are driven to harming the area, with the mindset of "Oh well, we can stop it later, if we find flaws in the plan." And we all know that once the ball is rolling it is far harder to stop. So, I am asking you to STOP this now!

There are multiple reasons that we oppose this rezone request, what follows are just a few;

- 1) Regarding LCC17.12.100.3 "Use" will have a NEGATIVE Anticipated effect upon the population, in that it will increase the use of infrastructure. The previous use of forest, only impacted the residence during the years that active logging was done (maybe every 20-30 years). The proposed "Use" would have a negative impact by increasing the road use into the area/Mineral every weekend during camp use.
- 2) Regarding LCC17.12.100.3 "Use" will NOT provide an increase in "employment distribution" in as much as the YMCA has stated at meeting in Mineral and during Planning meetings that they "Hire" from all over the area, state and even internationally. They also stated that they would TRY to hire locally, as they would need some "seasonal" and "part time" jobs for locals.
- 3) The YMCA has as part of their stated use of the "Land" would include a "Dock". This would have a NEGATIVE Anticipated effect. The installment of a dock by the YMCA will require them to provide a "secure swim and boating area" as all Youth Organizations are required to provide. This will require the YMCA to request a cordoned off area in the lake that will restrict use by Local and State wide residents.
- 4) It seems that an organization that espouses exposing youth to the environments would not want to expose youth hazardous water, arsenic. "Mitigation" is a financial or services payment to offset the negative impact on a person of an exposure to a known contaminate. Why would you as Commissioners (parents) exposes youth to the water, even if just for a week?
- 5) The YMCA of Greater Seattle and its representatives have and continue to make misleading, disingenuous and untruthful statements. They are using a phased approach to the project/permitting process so that you are supposed to only vote on what is in front of you at this phase of the process. But the future phases would have the biggest negative impacts and this would be to late to stop or refine.

Lastly, we are asking again that you vote NO on the rezone! Please don't vote based on the fear of a Law Suit against the county, we as a resident would rather our tax dollars be used to fight this in court rather than just rolling over to the YMCA and out of sequence process.

Re: Support for adoption of Ordinance 1343, Mineral Lake YMCA Rezone Proposal

East Lewis County Communities including Packwood and Mineral have been transitioning for the last 3 decades from a primary timber resource based economy to more of a resort, tourism, outdoor recreation, and retirement economy. Thousands of timber resource acres have been rezoned for residential development and other purposes. There has normally been no or little opposition to these rezones as the evolution of the economy has created a need for more residential and other development.

I think everyone can agree that Mineral Lake is a beautiful place. So far, it hasn't suffered the fate of lakes closer to the urban areas, many of which are ringed by standalone vacation housing. The Mineral Lake property has been a working forest. Optimally harvested working forest land is not necessarily environmentally friendly. It's a patchwork of ugly clearcuts, which take decades to regrow. Recent clearcuts are prone to erosion and cutover forests don't support the diversity of flora and fauna found in natural forests. You only need observe the recent massive clearcuts near Mineral, adjacent to SR7 to confirm this.

Unless State Parks, Fish and Wildlife, Lewis County Parks, or the Nisqually Tribe wants to purchase this property and maintain it as a public natural area, the YMCA proposal is the most environmentally friendly, least intrusive, and best future use of this Mineral Lake property.

I have recently visited Mineral. The access to the YMCA property is well away from the town site. It's unlikely most residents would even notice the camp area and its camp goers and staff, although it might support a little more business in the community. I heard community concerns about water and other fears. From reading through the proposal documentation, I believe the Planning Commission and staff have recognized all of these community and environmental concerns and have insured they will be addressed and, if need be, mitigated in the project planning and permitting process. I believe the YMCA will be a good and responsible neighbor to the community and good steward of the environment.

I'm sure the members of the BOCC have every confidence in the Lewis County Planning Commission and staff as expressed by confirmation of their recommendations in nearly every case. After careful study, due diligence, the required public process, and much discussion, the Planning Commission and staff determined that the petitioner's project can meet all of the criteria including the provisions of the Growth Management Act and all relevant Lewis County Code and has recommended approval.

We, in East Lewis County, have experienced and are experiencing this evolution in our communities. Everyone wants a better future, but a better future involves welcoming individuals, businesses, and organizations who will have a positive influence on our future. We can't be the abominable "No" people who shut out everything that is not part of the way things were 40 years ago and tell these people to take their ideas, projects, and capital elsewhere.

The YMCA facility will be a great new addition to the evolving Mineral Lake area community and best use of the property for all of the reasons stated in the planning commission staff reports. Please welcome them and don't shut them out.
